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Safety record boosts funding for the Starlight Children's Foundation

A commendable workplace safety record at Incitec Pivot Limited's Dyno Nobel ammonium nitrate project under construction at Moranbah has earned the Starlight Children's Foundation a donation of \$25,000.

The engineering, construction and production team of up to 800 people working on the project has clocked up 1.5 million hours without a lost-time injury.

The \$935 million plant is being built by the Project Aurora team of UGL Resources and its partners Conneq Infrastructure Services and BGC Contracting.

"This is a fantastic performance considering the magnitude of the project, the complex nature of the work, the number of different companies involved and the at-times adverse weather," said Kyle Gimpl, Dyno Nobel's Moranbah Operations Manager.

"The entire Project Aurora team has kept safety as a top priority and there is a genuine belief in and commitment to IPL's value of Zero Harm for Everyone Everywhere."

UGL Resources Chief Executive David Simpson added: "Project Aurora manages safety on site by encouraging proactive reporting of hazards and recording of all incidents.

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“This allows us to continuously improve and optimise safety processes on site, helping to achieve the goal of zero harm.”

The Project Aurora team voted the Starlight Children’s Foundation, which brightens the lives of seriously ill and hospitalised children and their families, as the preferred charity for IPL’s donation.

Kyle Gimpl presented the donation to Starlight Children’s Foundation volunteer Nikki McWhinney, of Mackay, at the Dyno Nobel site at Moranbah today.

He said: “Through Dyno Nobel, IPL is strongly committed to supporting both the local and wider communities, as we have shown by housing all production employees within the Moranbah township.

“We are very pleased that our donation will benefit seriously ill children in the Moranbah district and further afield.”

Acknowledging the donation, Amy Gilsenan, Partnerships Executive of the Starlight Children’s Foundation, said: “Thanks to Incitec Pivot’s incredible donation, the Starlight Children’s Foundation will be able to continue delivering its life-changing programs to more seriously ill children in the Moranbah district and across Queensland.

“Starlight grants wishes for seriously ill children across Australia and provides hospitals with fun centres – mobile entertainment units loaded with all the games, music and movies that kids love.”

Starlight supports children in the Moranbah district who are extremely ill and need to travel hundreds of kilometres to the Mater Children’s Hospital in Brisbane for specialist treatment through its innovative Starlight Express Room and Captain Starlight programs.

These programs are designed to distract children from pain and the isolation of hospital life, giving them a reason to smile.

The Dyno Nobel ammonium nitrate project, which will supply explosives products to mining companies in the Bowen Basin, is scheduled to begin operations in mid-2012.

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
