Driver sentenced for hit and run

A DRIVER has been sentenced following a hit and run crash that left a cyclist with fractures to the ribs, sternum, wrist

Gail Pilling, 40, of Kitsmead Lane, Chertsey, appeared at Staines Magistrates' Court on Wednesday after pleading guilty to the offences of failing to stop at the scene of an injury accident and failing to report the

The crash happened on April 12 at the junction of Green Lane and the High Street in Addlestone, with Surrey Police issuing an appeal to find the driver who left the scene.

As well as Pilling's licence being endorsed with 10 points, she was also given a 12 month community order, a 20 day rehabilitation order, and ordered to carry out 160 hours' unpaid work, pay a £60 victim surcharge and £87 in costs.

£1,000 giveaway to fight crime

SURREY'S Police and Crime Commissioner is to give away £1,000 at Spelthorne's next crime summit meeting.

A feedback form and short questionnaire regarding priorities for next year's Community Safety Strategy will be given to each attendee at the end of the event.

Completed forms will be exchanged for either a free personal attack alarm with a torch, or a 24 hour timer plug to switch lights on and off.

MORE than 20 elderly residents were treated to a fish and chip meal after being evacuated from sheltered housing block in Sunbury when a fire broke out on Wednesday morning.

The blaze happened at Beechwood Court, Churchill Way, shortly before 10.30am when a tumble dryer overheated and caught alight in the laundry room.

Six fire engines from Sunbury, Esher, Painshill, Egham and Chertsey were called to the incident, along with an aerial platform Guildford fire station.

Dance teacher Kelli Dixon, who leases Churchill Hall for classes, was working when she saw the elderly residents outside and invited them in.

She said: "We're closed until Saturday for the summer break, but I came by to do some admin work. I turned up and there were four fire engines, so I couldn't

Mr Grant added that crews extinguished the blaze using on-site fire extinguishers and a hose reel, along with six breathing apparatus kits.

The staff did very well and the firefighters worked extremely hard, so credit to them," he added.
